#### A-MAIS-ing Creek Bugs


Often my articles talk about projects in the watershed or I report on data that we collect. We analyze data to determine how well our acid mine drainage (AMD) projects are working to improve water quality in the Raccoon Creek Watershed. I'm here this time to explain some of the biological data collection we do every year.

Raccoon Creek is home to small animals called macroinvertebrates. These animals have no backbone and can be seen with the naked eye. Macroinvertebrates include aquatic insects, crustaceans, mollusks, and aquatic worms. These small animals are important water quality indicators because they live all or part of their lives in the water. Therefore, they are good long term water quality indicators. Also they are a food source to fish and birds and play an important role in the food chain. One group of macroinvertebrates, the dragonfly larvae, begin their life in the water and can spend most of their lives in the water (up to two years). Then when they emerge from the water, the larvae's exoskeleton cracks open and the winged adult emerges. As adults they may only live a few weeks to up to one year.

Raccoon Creek partners collect macroinvertebrates in the creek with the help of Ohio University staff & students, ODNR Division of Mineral Resources Management, AmeriCorps members, other watershed groups, and community volunteers. The macroinvertebrates are collected in the summer and preserved in ethanol. During the winter the preserved bugs are identified and counted using a microscope. The number of different families found and overall number of

macroinvertebrates collected are used to generate a score. They are scored using the Macroinvertebrate Aggregated Index for Streams (MAIS) to generate a score ranging from 0 "very poor" to 18 "very good." Some macroinvertebrates are sensitive to AMD pollution and some are tolerant to AMD pollution. Therefore the variety and number of each family we find determines the MAIS score. When we collect data year after year we are able to measure biological recovery over time.


