

# Sarah Landers Cornwell says her good byes to RCP.

# I Fell in Love with a Creek (and fell in it a few times too) By: Sarah Landers Cornwell



I didn't grow up playing in creeks. I had done some camping and hiking growing up, but I would never have considered myself an "outdoors" person. Back in the summer of 2010, the first time I put on chest waders and stepped into Raccoon Creek, I was terrified.

Serving as a Rural Action Stream Restore Corps AmeriCorps member with RCP from 2010-2011 was a life changing decision; that I won't ever regret, nor soon forget. In the four years that followed I had the pleasure and honor of serving as the Raccoon Creek Water Quality Specialist. The job was not an easy one and very often I was pushed out of my comfort zone trudging through the woods in the middle of nowhere, sliding down muddy stream banks, learning how to winch boats, lugging electrofishing equipment in +90 degree heat, presenting & teaching hundreds of people each year, running kids watershed camps, checking & fixing the Carbondale Doser in below zero temperatures, plunging my hands in cold winter waters, wrangling fish, and picking macroinvertebrates out of kick nets until I began to see them wiggling even when I closed my eyes.

Bit by bit I became a scientist, a mentor, a teacher, a community resource, a water protector. Though the opportunities presented to me I became certified at the highest level of OEPA chemical water quality monitoring, became a proficient grant writer, learned to canoe, got over my fear of public speaking, and I can now more than just wrangle those fish. Community outreach and environmental education become my passion and as much as I came to love field work, developing relationships with local landowners, RCP board members, community groups, Soil & Water Conservation District members, and agency folks at all levels of government become the most fulfilling aspect of my work.

The last two years my role changed as I took on an Environmental Specialist position with Ohio University's Voinovich School Energy & Environment Program. I was able to use my creekside lessons to help bring more resources to the region and more attention to water quality issues in Raccoon Creek. Although I am deeply saddened that my time vocationally serving Raccoon Creek has come to an end; I have a new and exciting adventure ahead. I'll be staying in the area and working for another regional non-profit, the Appalachian Center for Economic Networks, ACEnet. I'll be using my skill-set to help ACEnet create a sustainable and healthy local economy by providing opportunities for all residents to start businesses, obtain quality jobs, and connect with other entrepreneurs for mutual benefit. I am specifically focusing on providing assistance to food & agriculture entrepreneurs, ex-offenders reentering the workforce, and women business owners. After working on social and environmental justice issues in a region characterized by boom and bust non-renewable resource extraction, I now get to shift my focus to helping communities invest in their greatest renewable resource: their people.

I am ever grateful to Amy Mackey for continuing to hire me (for some still unknown reason!?) and for being a great mentor and dear friend (I can touch fish and know how to use all the ratchets thanks to you!). During my time serving Raccoon Creek Partnership, I made Appalachian Ohio my home, Raccoon Creek took hold of my heart, and I found dear friends and family in an ever expanding network of watershed folks. I had the opportunity to mentor hundreds of AmeriCorps members and students and I learned just as much from them as they did from me. I am truly blessed to have spent my time working with passionate people to keep a creek alive and teach conservation, restoration, and stewardship.

## RCP says its good byes to Sarah Landers Cornwell

It was early spring 2010 when Sarah Landers submitted her application for one of the Raccoon Creek AmeriCorps positions. We had already hired Kara Walton, who had been volunteering with the Raccoon Creek Partnership, and needed to hire one more person who we thought would work well with her. Typically we like to interview and hire people who we have worked with as volunteers or students, or people who have been highly recommended by someone in the watershed field, or at least someone with previous experience with acid mine drainage, chemical monitoring, and biology. We didn't know Sarah, *no one* that we worked with knew Sarah, and she had *no* experience with acid mine drainage, chemical monitoring, or biology..... BUT, her application and supporting documents were well written, complete, and above all, she seemed excited! At the time, Sarah had a good job at a consulting company in Columbus but she wanted to *get outside!* She wanted to do something that really made a difference.

So, we decided to interview her and made arrangements for her to come to Athens. A few days before the interview Sarah contacted me asking me what she should wear to the interview. I'd never been asked that question before....and I don't know how I answered it, but I'm sure in my head I was thinking "Well, clothing would probably be good!" So she showed up, wearing clothing, and managed to get there on time despite the horrendous Athens construction (I believe it was the Roundabout construction). She seemed nervous, but confident. Friendly, but not annoyingly so. She was VERY prepared, with a binder filled with her past work to share with us. Impressive!

It didn't take too much discussion to decide that Sarah seemed like a pretty good fit, and we decided to offer her the position. She accepted! August rolls around, and it's time for the new AmeriCorps to start. Sarah and Kara are both excited, and seem to be getting along great! WONDERFUL, we made the right choice!

And then I start learning things about Sarah. I learned that she was afraid to touch fish. WHAT?! And she has an intense irrational fear of all flying insects, EVEN butterflies. Butterflies?! And that she didn't know how to use tools, and didn't know the difference between screws and nails. And that she was TERRIFIED about storms. And totally obsessed with safety... Oh my this could be a long year.....

Then I start learning other things about Sarah. Like how excited she gets when she learns new things. And how quickly she catches on. And how obsessively organized she is about important things. And that she doesn't complain (well, not any more than me at least). And that she knows how to dress for the weather. AND that she was willing to work on the fish fear, but the flying bugs....not gonna happen.

Sarah was an amazing AmeriCorps member, serving her term with excitement and enthusiasm. She worked great in the field, in the office, with kids, with adults. Then when our beloved Water Quality Specialist at the time, Brian Blair, moved to Missouri with his family, Sarah applied for the job. Sarah had proved that she could complete the necessary tasks during her AmeriCorps term, so without reservation, we hired her on. Of course she did an amazing job.

Fast forward to fall 2017. Sarah is hired on at ACEnet in Athens, Ohio. A position that will allow her to use even more of her amazing talents. Of course we were all sad when Sarah left Raccoon Creek, but also so happy for her to find a job that fit her so well.

Sarah, thanks for 7 years of helping me keep the fish in Raccoon Creek alive. Thanks for keeping us all in line and on track with your dynamic tables and incredible attention to detail. Thanks for keeping us all safe out there. And above all, thanks for being an amazing friend!!!
